

# Brymbo Man

## Wrexham's Oldest Inhabitant

On Monday 18th August 1958, workmen digging a trench outside 79, Cheshire View, Brymbo, discovered a large stone slab about a foot beneath the surface. They removed the corner of the stone, only to find a hole underneath. One of the men shone a light through into the darkness to reveal the remains of a human skeleton in a stone-lined grave...

Work stopped and the experts were called in. Archaeologists from the National Museum of Wales in Cardiff, eager to investigate this chance discovery, travelled north to Brymbo. They excavated the grave and found the partial remains of a skeleton lying in a crouched position, a decorated pottery beaker and a flint knife. They quickly realised the historic importance of the finds and agreed arrangements for their transfer to Cardiff for further study.

### Introducing Brymbo Man

Within days, the skeleton found in the stone-lined grave was named Brymbo Man, but who was he and what do we know about him?

We can tell a lot by studying his remains. He was a rugged looking, powerfully built man, about 5'9" (173cm) tall, who led an active lifestyle. He was about 35 years old when he died. He survived a serious injury to his head, and his bones show no sign of disease. These facts are generally agreed, but when was he alive and where did he come from?

The answers to these questions have changed as our knowledge of the past has increased. Back in 1958, Brymbo Man was one of the Beaker Folk, a distinct race, who migrated to Britain from continental Europe about four thousand years ago and slowly pushed westwards. These immigrants, unlike the natives, knew how to work metal. They buried their dead individually with grave goods - including their characteristic beakers. The design of the beakers changed over time and Brymbo Man's short-necked beaker was dated to around 1700 - 1600 BC, so dating the burial itself.



The latest interpretation is very different. Brymbo Man may have been an 'incomer', but he wasn't necessarily a member of a different ethnic group. There were no Beaker people; ideas spread through trade and cultural contacts. Local people mastered new skills and adopted new ideas as they encountered them according to their own needs. The first beakers appeared in Britain around 2500 BC and Brymbo Man's beaker probably dates between 2200 - 1900 BC.

There is much more we can learn about Brymbo Man and science can provide some of the answers.

### Cyffwrdd Dyn Brymbo

Nawddodd yr atebion i'r cwestiynau hyn wrth i'n gwybodaeth gynyddu am y gorffennol.

Yn ôl yn 1958, un o Bobi y Bicwr oedd Dyn Brymbo, hi'r wahanol a fuddod i Brydain a gfrandir Ewrop tua oshair mil o fynyddoedd yn ôl a chynraedd y gorllewin yn raddol. Yn wahanol i'r brodorion, roedd y mwntidwyr hyn yn gwybod sut i weithio metel. Roeddent yn claddu eu meirw ar eu pennau'u hunain gyda newyddau bedd - gan gynnwys eu biceri nodweddiadol. Nawddodd cynllun y biceri drosglywdd a ddiwydd bicwr gwyd by Dyn Brymbo i 1700 - 1600 CC, gan ddyddio'r giaddedigwaith ei hun.

Mae'r dehongliad diweddaraf yn wahanol iawn. Etallia mai 'mewnffudwr' ydychi, oedd Dyn Brymbo ond nid oedd o angenrheidiwydd yn parhau i grwp eithrig gwahanol. Nid oedd unrhyw Bobi Bicwr, roedd syniadau'n lledaenu trwy fasnach a chysylltiadau diwyllianol. Meistrloedd pobl lleol sgiliau newydd a mabwyslada syniadau newydd wrth iddynt ddod ar eu traws yn unol â'u hanghienion eu hunain. Ymddangosodd y biceri cynnal yn Mwydain o Gampas 2500 CC ac mae bicwr Dyn Brymbo'n dyddio rhwng 2200 CC a 1900 CC yn ôl pob tebyg.
